
MONTHLY WEBINAR

A new free monthly webinar series analyzing ME workforce strategies launched with a conversation about managing remote workers.

The series, called **Business Blueprint: Workforce Strategies in Maine's Evolving Economy**, features guests with lived experience and subject matter expertise, sharing best practices, opportunities, and resources to benefit ME businesses and workers.

The series is produced and presented by The Harold Alfond Center for the Advancement of Maine's Workforce, the short-term workforce training center for the ME Community College System (MCSS), according to a news release from the center. Guests Bruce Walker from L.L. Bean and Julia Trujillo Luengo with the state's Department of Economic and Community Dev. talked with host Joshua Howe, MCCS deputy executive director of workforce training and remote work.

Luengo updated viewers on the implementation of the state's 10-yr economic plan and the initial findings of a recent employer survey, and Walker shared how L.L. 

The Revitalization of Skowhegan. Leadership. Strategy. Momentum.

If you haven't been to Skowhegan lately, we encourage you to make the trip. With the injection of more than \$650 million into the community, including a \$20 million historic downtown mill redevelopment that will include a taproom, boutique hotel rooms, and housing—all with a river view; a new coffee shop, artist studio, candy store, and makers market adding to the vibrancy of the commercial district; and several other exciting initiatives that will bolster the outdoor recreation and local food economy, the momentum in Skowhegan is palpable.

Main Street Skowhegan is boldly leading the way, with the implementation of key economic, community, and workforce development programs and projects:

Skowhegan Outdoors AmeriCorps Program: Providing free outdoor recreation activities & gear for community members at 65 Water St.; workforce development & training for AmeriCorps facilitators.

Skowhegan River Park: Project management and fundraising (more than \$7 million raised!) for redeveloping Skowhegan's industrial river corridor into a whitewater kayak and river surf park with enhanced river access and a natural channel for tubing and fish passage. **Riverfront Development:** Project management and fundraising (\$2 million raised!) for revitalizing the riverfront from the Old Mill Pub to the municipal building.

Trail Master Plan for Skowhegan: Planning for more than 50 miles of interconnected trails accessible via downtown for walking, biking, xc skiing, snowshoeing, and more.

Skowhegan Center for Entrepreneurship: Coworking & meeting space, entrepreneurial trainings, and workforce programming at 181 Water St.

The Kitchen at 185: Future shared commercial kitchen incubator at 185 Water St. that will reduce barriers to entry for food entrepreneurs, bolster production of value-added agricultural products, and offer culinary workforce training.


